Socially Connected: Physically Protected

Practical considerations and recommendations for faith-based communities – 14 May 2020

Amended 24 June 2020 to reflect an easing on the restriction on singing.

The Falkland Islands Government on 1 May, 2020, announced it was appropriate to ease some restrictions put in place in late March in response to the global COVID-19 pandemic.

These changes, which were effective 11 May, include allowing greater social interaction. Recognising the importance of faith to well-being, faith based communities can now begin to consider ways in which they can safely recommence formal gatherings supporting the well-being of their communities.

The following are some basic recommendations to support good public health hygiene.

Recommendations:

- Providing handwashing/sanitisation facilities at the entrance to buildings
- Opening churches and places of worship for private prayer and contemplation
- Restarting spoken services with social distancing of two metres between different households within the building
- Considering the restarting of Communion type services in which case the officiating priest should sanitise their hands before administering Communion, and consider wearing a surgical mask
- Singing in buildings is considered safe providing there is adequate social distancing between household bubbles within the building. (amended 24 June 2020)
- Avoiding the use of intinction so either using single element Communion or the Communal (or individual) cup with good hygiene between Communicants as usual
- Avoiding large social gatherings such as shared refreshments after service

These recommendations are for guidance and may change as the situation develops.
