Overview

The FIG Environment Department held a public consultation on the proposed designation of a national park in the Hill Cove Mountains, from February to April 2024.

The consultation asked the public and key stakeholders to examine the draft policy and management plan for the park, and to consider the proposals for location, attributes, access, off-road driving, grazing, managing fire risk, visitor safety and infrastructure.

A total of 138 digital and paper surveys were returned, and further comments were collected through a series of information drop-in sessions held in Stanley, Port Howard, Hill Cove and Fox Bay. A total of 23 people attended the drop-in sessions. The results of the public consultation and a summary of responses received are presented in this report. The comments and considerations raised by stakeholders and the public are being used to improve the policy and management plan, which will be finalised and taken to ExCo.

Key findings from the public survey

- 67% of respondents agreed with the concept of designating a national park in the Falklands Islands.
- 54% agreed with the proposed location of the national park and its boundaries.
- There were divided opinions about proposals for providing access:
 - 48% of respondents agreed with the proposed arrangements for how access to the national park by foot is provided for.
 - 54% agreed with the proposal to restrict the use of vehicles within the proposed park.
- 55% of respondents agreed with the proposed approach for managing grazing within the national park.
- 65% agreed with the proposed approach to managing fire in the national park.
- 51% agreed with the proposal to restrict additional infrastructure and facilities in the park.
- Main topics arising from the public information sessions were access, fire risk, health and safety, impacts of visitors, and infrastructure and facilities.



Figure 2: Themes arising from comments on the proposed location of the national park and its boundaries



In total, 40 respondents provided a wide range of comments relating to whether the identified attributes and values are adequately considered in the policy and management plan. Themes included access, off-road driving, grazing, health and safety, recreation and tourism, environmental protection, plants and wildlife and historical uses.

The question also asked respondents if there were any other attributes and values that had not been considered. Comments included the importance of the mountains as a water catchment area, the importance of the area for invertebrate fauna, and the MoD facility on Mt Adam. At the information drop-in sessions participants shared stories and memories about their experiences in the mountains.







Figure 6: Themes arising from comments on the proposed approach to managing fire in the park




